Cambridge to Become a Blackboard University Development Partner Focusing on e-Research

In addition to the licensing of the Blackboard Academic Suite, Cambridge has also become one of Blackboard's university development partners joining the beta program for the Blackboard Learning System to be built on Microsoft's .NET framework. As a university development partner, Cambridge will help guide the creation and development of future Blackboard products, primarily in the area of e-Research. The Blackboard .NET Beta program provides Cambridge and other leading institutions the opportunity to work with Blackboard to easily integrate and extend the Blackboard Academic Suite with custom applications and learning tools. For example, using both Blackboard Building Blocks technology and Microsoft .NET, Cambridge will explore workflow driven peer-to-peer

collaborative learning applications and complex group assignments such as those demanded by the Clinical School.
