Why the Next Education President Will Be Like Bush

To me, that's good. I am among the majority of Americans who support the thrust of the No Child Left Behind law. I might have problems with parts of it, but it is a useful bipartisan law and mostly makes sense. That cannot happen without the No Child Left Behind mandate to test students regularly, make results public and motivate lagging schools to get better.

Anyone who tries is going to hear this from every opponent: "Oh, so you DON'T want our schools to be accountable? We have to show progress at our jobs. Why shouldn't our kids' teachers do the same?"
