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1. The Sakai Foundation Announces the Release of the Sakai Collaboration and Learning Environment, Version 2.2.0

Our thanks go out to the dozens of dedicated volunteers from around the world for their tireless work on this release. With fixes or enhancements covering more than 500 community-reported issues, Sakai 2.2.0 offers improvements in many different areas. Among the highlights are:

- Improved functionality in numerous existing tools

The Resources, Assignments, and Schedule tools are now "group-aware," allowing access to be restricted to groups defined by site administrators. The Help tool incorporates some style improvements and is updated with current content.

- Closer integration with the Open Source Portfolio

Releases of OSP, an existing suite of tools supporting portfolio activities, are now synchronized with Sakai, and OSP is available as a provisional tool in Sakai. Using OSP, individuals can collect items, reflect, design portfolios, and publish them to designated audiences. Instructors and program administrators are able to provide structure and guidance to an individual's work using step-by-step (sequential) wizards, matrices of goals/standards, and hierarchies to organize related work.

- New provisional tools developed by Sakai community members

These include: Message Center, a discussion and messaging tool, and Post'Em, an automated system for reporting grades and comments to individual site members, both developed at Indiana University (USA); Search, a Google-like engine for searching site content, developed at the University of Cambridge (UK); and, Summary Calendar, a compact calendar view for a site or user's Schedule events, developed at the Universidade Fernando Pessoa (Portugal).

- User interface, consistency, and accessibility improvements

FCKeditor, an improved WYSIWYG editor first used in Sakai 2.1, replaces HTMLArea as the default editor throughout Sakai; HTMLArea is still included and can be set to the default if desired. Work to simplify and refine skinning capabilities in Sakai continues in this release, and the three top-scoring skins from the recent Skin Contest (Soy Bean, Tofu, and Bamboo) are included in the distribution. New French and Catalan interface translations and an update to the Japanese one are also available in this release as part of an expansion of internationalization efforts. Accessibility enhancements for this release include accesskeys for common functions (Save, View or Preview, Cancel or Delete, Save Draft, Help) and the extension of heading tags to include form labels and table subjects.

- Major technical enhancements and new developer resources

The restructuring of the Sakai framework into more logical units is complete with this release. Coupled with changes to the main subversion repository, the changes should improve future collaborative development efforts. In addition, Sakai user records now use two sets of identifiers, one internal that is unique and permanent, the other external and changeable depending on organizational needs. Finally, a "Programmer's Café," first presented at the Vancouver conference in June, uses this release as the primary platform to introduce programmers to the Sakai environment and facilitate tool development.

Community Matters.

Open source enthusiasts from higher ed institutions around the world converged on Vancouver, BC, this past spring for a week of co-located conferences, including Sakai, OSP, and JA-SIG's uPortal. Attendees of the Sakai conference heard from keynoter Mitchell Baker, "Chief Lizard Wrangler" and president of Mozilla, the technology company widely known for its Internet applications Firefox and Thunderbird. Baker's talk was loaded with perspectives on open source. Her mantra? "The community matters."

Executive Director Named.

The Sakai Foundation Board capped its conference with the announcement that University of Michigan Software Architect and high-performance computing researcher Charles Severance would become the foundation's executive director. Severance's recent work has spanned Sakai, the NEESgrid project, and the NSF Middleware Initiative grid portal project.

In a Blue Moon.

Mike King, IBM's director of market development/education industry, detailed the company's latest contributions to the open source community in higher ed. Software assets include SCORM Tracker, a plug-in for tracking learning materials using the standard; and a presentation converter to convert PowerPoint and Open Office presentations to SCORM objects. IBM also is expanding support for the developer community, and will provide a senior architect to the Sakai community. King talked about the potential for commercial offerings of Sakai, and touched on a plan to pilot a hosted service.

OCW Tool for Sakai.

At one of the many concurrent sessions, University of Michigan Collaborative Technologies Laboratory Director and Sakai Board Chair Joseph Hardin described a new tool being developed to "make it possible for anybody who's using Sakai as their collaboration and learning environment—their course management system—to easily put

their materials, if they wish, in an OCW (OpenCourseWare) site and make them available to the world."

Commercial Support Grows.

Institutions interested in Sakai don't have to feel limited by their internal capacity to work with open source software, because vendor support for just about any configuration is available today. rSmart introduced its own commercial Sakai CLE (Collaborative Learning Environment) at the conference, and a large team provided extensive information and demos. President Chris Coppola, who also is on the board of the Sakai Foundation, summed up his enthusiasm for Sakai: "I'm proud that so many of us at rSmart are working among this amazing community of people with such an important mission and unprecedented potential to achieve it."

Demo Fest.

Unicon, Elluminate, and other vendors, plus institutional developers such as Virginia Tech, Indiana University, and others, offered a mix of technical demos ranging from discipline-specific tools, quizzes, and assessment tools, to podcasting and IBM's "Classroom of the Future" scenarios.
