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### 1. Nominations for the Sakai Foundation Board of Directors Close on September 30

Please get your nominations in to the Sakai Elections Work Group as soon as possible.

Details: Nominations are open for three positions on the Sakai Foundation Board of Directors. Chuck Severance now serves in the position of Executive Director and therefore an ex officio member of the Board. The current terms for Joseph Hardin

(University of Michigan), and Lois Brooks (Stanford) expire in December. Previous board members are eligible to stand for re-election.

The Sakai Foundation is dedicated to the design and development of collaborative, open source software in support of education, research and related scholarly activities. The Board of Directors provides leadership for the Sakai Foundation by serving the interests of the entire Sakai community, promoting the objectives of the Sakai Foundation, representing and coordinating Foundation projects, ensuring that project management is consistent with the Foundation's mission, and that the Foundation operates within its fiscal resources.

The Board of Directors meets in person at least twice a year at such times and places as designated by the Chair. Board members are expected to attend bi-weekly audio conferences and regularly conduct Board business electronically. Board members are not compensated for their work but expenses will be reimbursed in line with Foundation policies. Nominees will be expected to confirm that their institutional leadership approves of this commitment of time if elected.

Board members shall serve for a term of three years. Board members may serve only two consecutive terms. More detailed information about the Sakai Foundation and the responsibilities of the Board of Directors can be found in the Bylaws of the Sakai Foundation.

Nominations must be emailed to [sakaiproject\\_elections@umich.edu](mailto:sakaiproject_elections@umich.edu) no later than 5:00 PM EDT (GMT-4) on Saturday, September 30, 2006. Anyone can be nominated to stand for election to the Board. Self-nominations are also allowed. Receipt of any nomination you submit will be confirmed. The Elections Work Group will notify all nominees, explain the expectations for board members and confirm their willingness and ability to run for election. If they agree, additional information about them will be solicited.

Board members will be elected by the institutional and corporate representatives as specified in the Sakai Foundation bylaws. A current list of institutional and corporate representatives has been posted at:

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## 2. Largest Community College in North Carolina Partners with Optimized Learning and Houghton Mifflin to Pilot Sakai

Central Piedmont Community College (CPCC), the largest two-year college in North Carolina, has recently begun a pilot of the open source distance learning platform, Sakai. The school has partnered with Optimized Learning, Inc. (OLi), Unicon, and Houghton Mifflin to provide select students with access to an online English 112 course. OLi is hosting the pilot for CPCC. The school, in coordination with CPCC's Futures Institute, has been exploring alternatives to the commercial online platform they are currently using. CPCC built a team of faculty and administration to explore open source options for the school's online learning initiative. The team included Dr. Rod Townley, Dean IT/Engineering, and the Futures Institute, Melissa Vrana, Director of eLearning Development and Delivery, Instructional Developer, Catalina Ramirez, and Rebecca Fagan, English Distance Learning Instructor. After evaluating many options, the team settled on piloting Sakai 2.2, an open source online learning program that allows tremendous flexibility for the academic setting. The team was also enthusiastic about Sakai's price tag: the software is free. Once CPCC settled on Sakai, the school sought out the open source expertise and hosting capabilities of Optimized Learning (OLi) and Unicon. OLi hosts the pilot version, and Unicon is providing training for faculty and IT staff on how to use Sakai. Once the decision was made to pilot Sakai for fall classes, OLi and Unicon had the course up and running within 6 weeks. Speaking to the potential hesitancy faculty may have regarding switching from a known platform to Sakai, Rebecca Fagan noted enthusiastically, "Sakai is extremely easy to use. The transition from the commercial platform we've been using to Sakai's interface involves less than a two-hour learning curve."

To ease the transition even more, OLi and Unicon are providing a duplicate of the English course in Sakai and making it available to all faculty and staff at CPCC. Butch Porter, OLi's CEO, notes that "...OLi's mission is to help schools of all sizes learn about and make the transition to the freedom and lower cost of using open source e-learning solutions. We're thrilled to be working with CPCC by hosting their Sakai test pilot." Additionally, Houghton Mifflin is providing English course content for the Sakai course. Brian Murphy, Houghton Mifflin's National Sales Manager, remarked "the Sakai pilot with the CPCC team has been a homerun for all involved." Those involved in the pilot at CPCC are enthusiastic about the new opportunities that an open source e-learning environment can provide.

That number is significant because it represents a "high water" mark far greater than the load its predecessor handled and shows tremendous progress towards turning off the legacy system in fall 2007. Some significant portion of the growth is due to local decisions by the School of Management and School of Public Health to convert from WebCT and Blackboard respectively. While Sakai, the software, clearly deserves praise, accolades are also due the stellar members of Yale's staff like David, Gloria, Cheryl, Mike, Jen, Andy, Matt and Tonie and countless others who dealt with the bow wave of faculty and students to make this possible.

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## 9. rSmart's Hannah Reeves will Demonstrate OSP at the Michigan Higher Education Sakai Conference

Hannah Reeves of the rSmart Group will be joining representatives from IBM, the Sakai Foundation, and the University of Michigan at the Michigan Higher Education Sakai Conference in Lansing, Michigan on October 3. Reeves will be demonstrating the latest Open Source Portfolio (OSP) tools and discussing how portfolio functionality is being used to enhance teaching, learning and assessment practices within the Sakai environment.

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## 10. Question Pool Import for Sakai 2.1.x

I'd like to let you know we are testing question pool import code for Sakai's 2.1.x Samigo implementation on our UC Davis instance. A Sakai 2.3 version was coded first and handed off to the Stanford team, but it needs code review and QA, and did not make the code freeze date.

What UCDavis Question Pool import does: Based on a review of BlackBoard and Respondus xml import documents I've received from other Sakai members, I coded the question pool import to follow the same ASI format as the current QTI v1.2 assessment import.

Currently, questions from an imported assessment may be assigned to a question pool one at a time. The advantage of the import question pool function to faculty is that an assessment exported from Samigo may be handed off to another faculty member for import as an assessment or as a question pool (or both.) Using the Question Pool import function, all questions are saved to the question pool at once. All question types which can currently be exported and imported as an assessment may also be imported as a question pool.

A limitation of this function is that only single-section imports will work. All the translated documents I have from other systems appear to be single-section, so this may not be a migration issue.

There is no conversion code yet for manual imports (via the Samigo UI) of BlackBoard, WebCT or Respondus quizzes, however, the Common Cartridge team have developed some translations for migration from other systems. These translations are developed based on the individual schools needs.

I'd like to hear from members whose schools have the need to import content from other systems, to get a better idea of what the priorities are for translation (i.e., BlackBoard, WebCT, Respondus, etc.)

Also, could I get a heads up on who might be interested in Sakai v2.1.x import question pool code once we're past the QA phase here?

As we move forward with import/export for Samigo, I'm looking forward to continuing discussions with Steve Lay, Zach Thomas, Joshua Ryan, and others regarding QTI v2.x and Common Cartridge, to improve my understanding and to see migration with media content become a reality. I hope to see you all in Atlanta this December!
