5. Article: Vula - University of Cape Town's New Connection

As of 2008, Vula will replace both Connect and WebCT, which are being phased out over a two-year time-frame. Vula will become the central learning and collaboration environment at UCT.

Vula, an initiative in operation since February 2006, has so far been used in over 100 courses across six faculties (representing 6300 users), supporting more than 50 project sites.

The Centre for Education Technology has been in charge of Vula's development. According to Stephen Marquard, Learning Technologies Co-ordinator at the Centre, Vula has generally been very well received by both students and staff. Student tutor, Amrish Bisson, is a big fan of the new system. "As a lecturer and Head Tutor in the Economics and Finance department, I have found Vula to be one of the best tools, not only to streamline administration in the course, but also to communicate with lecturers, tutors, and students alike," said Bisson.

However, some students have raised concerns about having to switch to Vula; criticizing UCT for wanting to fix something that is not broken. In response to concerns levelled, Marquard replied: "Vula is built on an open-source platform developed by the Sakai Project, a consortium of universities. This means that it is therefore more flexible and sustainable that either buying an off-the-shelf commercial package, or developing the software completely on our own."

Asked what changes users can expect, Marquard added that: "It has a different look and feel, but also has new capabilities, and can support a broader range of uses. For example, students can use it for project groups by creating new worksites. New tools include a Wiki tool, which can be used for collaborative writing or developing a knowledge base, and a Search tool, which will search all content, announcements and messages in Vula sites. UCT will also be adding the best custom-developed features from Connect to Vula, such as the ability to send SMS messages."

The word "Vula" means "open" in various African languages. It was chosen from over 100 submissions from UCT staff and students in a naming competition in 2005. Vula is looking to open new doors to all its users. "In the long term it will ultimately be more beneficial to both staff and students," Marquard confidently predicts.

6. New Online Learning and Collaboration Tool for NWU

Education at the North-West University (NWU) will soon receive a new lease of life with the introduction of an online collaboration and learning tool, called eFundi. The tool, powered by Sakai (an online collaborative and learning project), is aimed at supporting teaching, collaboration, learning and research in higher education cycles.

Joseph Hardin, director of Collaborative Technologies Laboratory at the University of Michigan and Board Chairperson of the Sakai foundation, was recently invited to the NWU to present a workshop on best ways to implement the tool.

However, according to NWU project coordinator, Boeta Pretorious, the process of putting the tool in place is already underway at the university. "We intend to start with the implementation early next year, if all goes according to plan," he said. "We start with three pilots, one per campus, starting this week and running for the rest of the year."

Upon implementation, a user support group will be mobilised to support the effective running of the project.

Sakai is a free open source product built and maintained by the Sakai community.

eFundi comes from the Zulu word Funda which means learn. Fundi is a master of learning and the e in front of Fundi stands for electronic.

11. University of Cape Town Poll Tool Voted a Hit

The University Of Cape Town, driven by a deadline to have a poll tool available for voting in our student elections, is almost ready. See Voting figure 1. (https://www.connect.uct.ac.za/sakaiwiki/index.php/See Voting figure 1)



Even though it was used during the voting process which ended last week, we still need to make sure all functionality requirements are met and take it through a QA process, before releasing it publicly.

Our legacy (course management) system has a poll tool which is used to gauge students' opinion and the results are usually made available immediately for all to see. We have seen usage of the tool grow so much and become such a necessity, that we could not imagine telling staff to migrate to Vula (our version of Sakai) without there being a similar alternative. So, when asked whether Vula could be used in the student elections, we said "yes" — even though we had not even started the developing poll tool! We saw it as an opportunity to increase the awareness of Vula. We posted each candidate's information on Vula and they also included our URL on their election posters which was advertised all over campus. Only approximately 10% of students logged on to vote, so we look forward to improving that next year.

The tool allows one to set a question, or set thereof, to the participants of a site who then select up to a specified maximum number of options. It also allows one to set the availability period and the results are dynamically created and made available to those with appropriate permissions. The results include the number of votes, overall percentage each option received, as well as how many people voted.
