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1. Polls are Open for the Election for Three Vacant Positions on the Sakai Foundation Board

The Sakai Board and the Elections Work Group are pleased to announce that the polls are open for the election for three vacant positions on the Sakai Foundation Board of Directors. The online voting site is now available to voting members, and will remain so through Wednesday, November 22. One voting representative from each member institution has been invited to cast votes for the three open positions. Results of this election will be announced in early December and new Board members will take their positions at the Sakai Conference in Atlanta. The Board of Directors provides leadership for the Sakai Foundation by serving the interests of the entire Sakai community, promoting the objectives of the Sakai Foundation, representing and coordinating Foundation projects, ensuring that project management is consistent with the Foundation's mission, and that the Foundation operates within its fiscal resources. Board members serve staggered, three-year terms. Seven candidates have accepted nominations for board service. 2. Atlanta Sakai Conference Updates

Andrew Booth is Professor of Online Learning at the University of Leeds and the recipient in 2002 of the prestigious European Academic Software Award (EASA). He is currently interested in the development of inter-institutional learning environments using service-oriented architectures.

3. Announcing the Atlanta Conference U-Camp!

On the Tuesday, December 5, before the Atlanta conference, the UI DG will be holding their first U-Camp to focus on the usability and user experience inside Sakai.

The U-Camp will provide an opportunity for those interested in the design and support of Sakai to meet, learn, and contribute to the future of the Sakai user experience. This preconference session will include a series of workshops and presentations in the morning where participants will discuss design methodologies, accessibility, patterns, and usability. In the afternoon, we will focus on strategies for improving user delight within Sakai and finding ways to better represent user needs within the community process.

We are especially interested in having the user support folks help drive our agenda and focus. In that light, we would like to ask you to submit your top five user experience issues with Sakai. 4. Reminder: Sakai Project Coordination Meeting 8-9 Dec 2006, Atlanta, Georgia

This is a reminder for those of you involved in Sakai 2.4 design and development: we are hosting a post-conference Sakai Project Coordination Meeting after the 6th Sakai

Conference in Atlanta. We currently have around 25 folks who have already RSVP'ed. So, please join us for this event, which is scheduled to begin directly after the main conference ends, starting at 1:30PM Friday (8-Dec-2006) and running to 2:00PM Saturday (9-Dec-2006). The main focus will be technical discussions and planning for the 2.4 and future releases of Sakai.

Sakai Foundation staff and key Sakai volunteers will be in attendance, including Charles Severance, Glenn Golden, Lance Speelmon, Megan May, Mark Norton, and Peter Knoop. Project Team Leads and Members working on the design and development of the various components of Sakai are also strongly encouraged to attend. Anyone interested in integrating their work in the 2.4-timeframe should also attend.

This event offers Sakai designers and developers an early opportunity to coordinate activities and plan for forthcoming Sakai releases; Sakai 2.4 is scheduled for Code Freeze on 15 March 2007 and release on 1 May 2007. The format of the meeting will be flexible to accommodate the evolving needs of this discussion. In some ways it will be much like an Integration Week, for those of you whom have participated in the past, though without the pressure of a fast-approaching deadline. :) We will kick things off and wrap things up with a group discussion, to brainstorm an agenda and to summarize the outcomes. In between we will have three rooms set aside so that discussions can break out and regroup as needed. We want to leave things relatively informal so that we can maximize our ability to meet the needs of discussions and activities of those that are able to attend. We expect this post-conference (perhaps sometimes pre-) meeting to become a regular feature of Sakai conferences.

(The Conference hotel room rate of \$134 is still available for this event -- it is effective thru Monday, 11 December 2006 -- remember to mention the Sakai Conference when booking.) 6. Kuali Foundation Announcements: Open Source Financial System, Research Administration System Project, New board members and Corporate Partners

The Kuali Financial System -- The Kuali Foundation has announced the first release of the open source Kuali Financial System (KFS), the first phase of a comprehensive set of open-source software tools to serve the financial system needs of higher education.

"The release of Financials makes clear the growing momentum for colleges and universities to take control of their enterprise software by pooling investments in community source projects," said Brad Wheeler, Indiana University chief information officer and chair of the Kuali Foundation. "The model shows that we can pool our investments, execute a disciplined project, and share the benefits of these efforts as part of a sustainable open source community."

The Kuali Financial System, funded in part by a \$2.5M grant from the Andrew W. Mellon Foundation, represents a major first step to establish a comprehensive series of modules for administrative functions in higher education. Designed to serve the financial system needs of all Carnegie Class institutions, KFS addresses core financial operations, including accurate accountability, timely reporting, efficient processing, and strengthened internal controls through computerized business rules. Kuali Research Administration -- The Kuali Foundation also announced its next development project as Kuali Research Administration, funded in part by a \$1.5M grant from the Andrew W. Mellon Foundation. Kuali Research Administration (KRA) will build on the models used successfully by Sakai and Kuali Financial Systems where the system is based on a proven design. KRA is based on an update of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology's proven COEUS system, one of the first cradle-to-grave award management systems in the nation. Indiana University, in close partnership with Cornell University and the Weill College of Medicine, MIT, Michigan State University, and the University Research Administration Offices. Two New Kuali Board Members -- Steven Dowdy of MIT and John Walda, president of the National Association of College and University Business Officers (NACUBO), have also been appointed to the Kuali Foundation Board of Directors. The Kuali Foundation also announced its first Kuali Commercial Affiliates to provide support for the open source Kuali software. Interest in the Kuali Foundation has grown significantly since the community source initiative was first announced in 2004, and the Kuali Foundation is now adding new college and university partners. "The Kuali Foundation Partners is the first opportunity for colleges, universities, commercial, and other not-for-profit organizations to join the Kuali Foundation and influence the direction of Kuali's important mission," said Wheeler.

Kuali Days, taking place November 14-15 in Tucson, Arizona, will be the next major gathering for the growing Kuali community.

7. Stockholm University Kicks Off a Major Sakai Deployment Project

Having spent more than a year supporting a number of pilot courses and projects using Sakai, Stockholm University recently kicked off a major deployment project aiming to deliver Sakai 2.3.x as a fully-functioning enterprise collaboration and learning environment to go into full production for the autumn semester 2007. The deployment project will systematically address the necessary points of integration between Sakai CLE and the University's generalised IT infrastructure, the student information system, identity management, development platform, support infrastructure as well as localised look-and-feel, and other local requirements.

The project will ensure that Sakai CLE (local brand name forthcoming) will be fully available for staff training during the second half of spring semester 2007. It is expected that adoption will be gradual and steady during the following semesters, particularly since there is no incumbent enterprise system at Stockholm University that Sakai replaces wholesale. Already, interest in Sakai and the ongoing under-the-radar pilot is on marked increase, however, which makes us quite confident that the fully supported upcoming enterprise CLE will be a hit among staff and students at Stockholm University.

8. Texas State Offers Video Interviews -- Faculty-to-Faculty Help Tips

Faculty members at Texas State University who are new to Sakai can now get tips on using the system from more experienced users at any time of the day or night. 10. WebAuth and Sakai

Here at Oxford we use WebAuth for web-based Single Sign On (SSO) and when looking at tools we like to see how easily they can be WebAuth enabled. Thankfully Sakai makes it all pretty easy. Sakai has the ability to support two authentication methods at the same time so we can have a login route for both Oxford users (WebAuth) and for internal Sakai users.

Previously we have used the Apache WebAuth module but this time I decided to attempt to use the Java WebAuth Filter developed as part of the SIPE project here at Oxford. One note is that the Standford WebAuth download pages have a newer version of the Java WebAuth filter than the SIPE pages. The Java WebAuth implementation only works with Java 1.5.

11. From the etc@bmc Blog: Educause Asks Blackboard to Drop Patent

Inside Higher Ed has reported that Educause, a nonprofit organization that promotes effective technology use in education, has sent a letter to Blackboard asking them to drop the patent they recently had approved over the summer. Many have said that the patent will prevent innovation in educational technology. From my limited experience (4 years) in this field and reading blogs by leaders in the field, it also seems to violate the kind of open sharing and communication that has existed for years. As many of us are the only instructional technologists on campus, we need to share information and tools with each other in order to be successful. We can't do this alone.

Blackboard has sued Desire2Learn for patent infringement already. A web site trying to fight against the patent by proving that other online learning applications existed prior to Blackboard (prior art) has been established. It has pointed to such resources as the EFF's Patent Busting Project, aimed at finding patents that have a profound effect on innovation and to begin challenging them.

This whole situation is reminiscent of Microsoft's wrangling with the Justice Department over 10 years ago. Sure, Microsoft survived that, but even regular users of Microsoft products often recognize that it participates in some ugly business practices and for many years, was basically a monopoly. And that's where, in my opinion, Blackboard is headed. It bought WebCT, so it is now a giant among proprietary course management systems. The question is, what will it do about budding open source projects like Sakai and Moodle? Will those projects decrease development out of fear of being sued? Is that the kind of atmosphere we want educational technology to function in? I don't think so.
