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1. Results of the Sakai Foundation Board Elections

The results of this year's Sakai Board elections were announced at the Welcome Reception of the 6th Sakai Conference with OSP in Atlanta.

- -- John Norman of the University of Cambridge has been elected Chairman of the Board.
- -- Joseph Hardin, University of Michigan, is the new Vice Chairman.
- -- Lois Brooks of Stanford University was re-elected as a Board Member.

-- Clay Fenlason, Boston University, has been elected to the Board and will fill the position vacated by Chuck Severance.

3. Kaleidoscope Launches World's First International Open Archive for Research on Technology Supported Learning

Grenoble -- The Kaleidoscope Network of Excellence has just launched TeLearn at www.telearn.org, the world's first internationally available Open Archive for technology-enhanced learning. TeLearn takes research results from across Europe drawn from diverse and converging disciplines such as computer, social and education sciences and puts them in one place. This contributes to one of the overarching drivers of Kaleidoscope -- to reduce duplication, so shaping the scientific evolution of the field.

TeLearn will benefit not only researchers, but also teachers, policy makers and the public, offering insight into up-to-date research in the field of ICT-supported learning. Dr. Nicolas Balacheff, scientific manager of the Kaleidoscope Network, sees the establishment of the Open Archive TeLearn as an important contribution to the further development of research in the field. "Thanks to TeLearn, scientists from extremely diverse fields have the opportunity for easy access to current research on this topic at any time," explains Balacheff. "This will make research more transparent and more effective." Furthermore, the systematic archiving of scientific works, which will make possible the direct comparison of results, will stimulate scientific competition in a positive way.

6. U. de Lleida and Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State U. Receive Mellon Awards

The Andrew W. Mellon Foundation awarded \$650,000 in prizes to ten not-for-profit institutions in the first annual Mellon Awards for Technology Collaboration (MATC). The Mellon Awards honor not-for-profit organizations for leadership in the collaborative development of open source software tools with particular application to higher education and not-for-profit activities. The awards were presented December 4, 2006, at the Fall Task Force meeting of the Coalition for Networked Information by Sir Timothy Berners-Lee, Director of the World Wide Web Consortium and the inventor of the World Wide Web. The ten recipients were selected from among more than 200 nominees.

\$50,000 was awarded to the Universitat de Lleida (Lleida, Spain, www.udl.es) for work on the Sakai course management system (www.sakaiproject.org). Universitat de Lleida was recognized by the Committee both for its work in making the Sakai course management system available in the Catalan language and for its extraordinary efforts around the introduction of consistent support for internationalization into Sakai under very tight deadline pressures. Lleida intends to use the award to further enhance and extend Sakai's internationalization capabilities.

Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University (Blacksburg, VA, www.vt.edu) will receive \$50,000 for work supporting the Sakai course management system (www.sakaiproject.org). Virginia Tech was recognized by the Committee for its essential contributions to quality assurance in the Sakai course management project, as well as for its innovative use of Moodle and Sakai as programming projects in computing classes. The University plans to use the award to develop a new lab-notebook tool for Sakai.

7. European Task Group for Implementing Open Source LMS Solutions

Four weeks ago a European working group was founded during a Blackboard/WebCT user meeting with the objective of implementing open source LMS solutions, e.g., Sakai in their institutions.

The reasons for this decision were the Blackboard patent, the pricing model, the lack of support from the Blackboard Company and the missing Web 2.0 tools and the bad integration of interfaces to other systems.

There are already some big European Universities participating in this task force and they are looking for new partners!!

By developing together migration tools -- not each University on their own -- these institutions will profit from synergies and build up a strong network among each other -- where your institution can participate!!!
