6. Debate Tool in Sakai

Hi All,

We are thinking of developing a simple text-based Debate tool in Sakai. Features include:

1. Group-aware participants list and access control
2. Instructor/teaching assistant user group can post debate topic with specific start/end time and select participants list
3. Participant can input their comment on the topic and state 'For' / 'Against' / 'Neutral'
4. Instructor/teaching assistant can add instructor comments in between discussion
5. After the end of the debate, instructor/TA can optionally put marks/grade the debate for each participant and able to submit this to grade book

The online debate mechanism is very effective and interesting for students to participate. We have been using similar application written in Perl in standalone basis and the feedback is excellent.

Do you have any interests or comment on this tool? We have not confirmed whether to build this tool from scratch or build upon some of the existing tool in Sakai yet so your input is really appreciated.

PAE11

Conduct analysis and programming tasks in data processing environment. Work on programming tasks. Analyze and correct problems with existing programs.

REQUIRED FOR PAE11: Bachelor's Degree plus 1 year's experience in systems analysis and programming. Education and experience may be substituted in a 2:1 ratio. Knowledge of data processing, systems analysis and office automation required. Experience in supporting applications in a Unix/Apache/Tomcat environment, Unix scripting languages, SQL, and relational database structures is required. Demonstrated knowledge of hardware and software for desktop workstations and networks is required.

PREFERRED: Experience in Java, J2EE, Spring, Hibernate, JSF, Junit, JDBC, Oracle, MySQL, object oriented design patterns is desired.

PAE13

Participate in and lead projects to analyze functional processes, determine system specifications, design solutions, write programs and implement critical system applications while maintaining production standards. Collaborate with UITS and university personnel to determine the processing needs and use standard system design techniques to architectures. Participate in the implementation of new applications, and provide troubleshooting and maintenance support for existing systems. Assist in planning and resolution of network configuration. Provide training and support to staff; serve as a resource for problem analysis and resolution.

REQUIRED FOR PAE13: Bachelor's Degree plus at least 3 years of experience in systems analysis or programming. A combination of equivalent work experience and education may be considered at a 2:1 ratio. Minimum of 2 years experience in systems analysis, developing and programming and user application support is required, including experience with creating and supporting applications in a Unix/Apache/Tomcat environment, Unix scripting languages, SQL, and relational database structures. Experience with Java, J2EE, Spring, Hibernate, JSF, Junit, JDBC, Oracle, MySQL, and object oriented design patterns is required.
