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1. 7th Sakai Conference in Amsterdam

KEYNOTE SPEAKER -- Hal Abelson is a founding director of the Free Software Foundation and of Creative Commons. He also serves as consultant to Hewlett-Packard Laboratories. At MIT, Abelson is co-director of the MIT-Microsoft Research Alliance in educational technology and co-head of MIT's Council on Educational Technology. He is also active in MIT's OpenCourseWare and DSpace (institutional digital archiving) initiatives.

Abelson is Professor of Electrical Engineering and Computer Science at MIT and a fellow of the Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers. He is winner of several teaching awards, including the IEEE's Booth Education Award, cited for his contributions to the teaching of undergraduate computer science. Abelson's research at the MIT Artificial Intelligence Laboratory focuses on 'amorphous computing', an effort to create programming technologies that can harness the power of the new computing substrates emerging from advances in microfabrication and molecular biology. He is also engaged

in the interaction of law, policy, and technology as they relate to societal tensions sparked by the growth of the Internet, and he is active in projects at MIT and elsewhere to help bolster our intellectual commons.

CONFERENCE PROPOSAL UPDATE -- We received a record-breaking 170 proposals by the March 15 deadline!

THE CONFERENCE TRACKS --

Teaching and Learning Track -- In the Teaching and Learning Track, instructors and all those interested in exploring new pedagogies can share innovative examples and discuss their use of technology (regardless of the scale of their Sakai implementation). Presentations that highlight best practices tied into current Sakai functionality (i.e., using a variety of different tools), and presentations that focus on alternative approaches to engage students while delivering on educational objectives, are welcome.

Technology Track -- Targeted at programmers, developers, and system administrators, this track covers the technical aspects of Sakai. It will focus on topics such as Java technologies (Spring / RSF / Portlets), programming best practices, and server technologies like Tomcat.

User Experience Track -- The goal of User Experience track is to showcase the human side of Sakai, bringing together presentations which address the design, use, and support of Sakai. It will cover topics related to user interface design and usability, accessibility, user support, and more.

Researcher's Track -- The Researchers' track highlights the use of Sakai to facilitate collaboration in the research community. Presentations will include best practices for facilitating research activities with Sakai, as well as results from a range of recent research on the use of Sakai in research settings.

Implementation Track -- The intended audience for this track is administrators, Information Technology management, and the like, who are interested in implementing Sakai in their organization. Sessions will include opportunities for sharing implementation experiences.

Note that if you will be making reservations that include a night that is outside of the June 8 to June 17 room block, you should fax your reservation or call your reservation in directly to the hotel. If you use the online reservations system and ask for a room outside

2. Sakai 2.4 QA Update

Sakai 2.4 QA kicked off on March 19 and testing is ongoing. Four days into the 6-week cycle there are 727 JIRA issues awaiting verification and 87 verified tickets. So much to do, so very little time!

The community needs your support in ensuring that this is best release to date. The earlier a bug is caught in the testing cycle, the better chance there is that we will have time to address it.

You may be asking yourself how those at your institution can help! There are a few ways

*** ADOPT A TOOL FOR REGRESSION TESTING ***

There are still quite a few tools categorizes as 'Core" that need someone to 'adopt' them (run a regression test). There typically isn't a lot of change going on in these tools so they should be routine and typically have very detailed test plans. These include Discussion, Help, My Workspace (Account, Preferences, Profile, Membership, etc.), News, Presentation, Wiki, Schedule, Post'em, Web Content, and WebDAV.

If you are interested in digging deep, areas that need attention include Portal changes,

Drop box (ensure Resources change hasn't had a negative impact), and Section Info/Site Setup (lot's of changes relating to CM).

There are also 4 new provisional tools that could greatly benefit from some community testing: MailTool, Page Order Helper, Polls and User Membership. While test plans aren't yet available, explorative testing often yields great results.

*** WORK THROUGH THE QA AWAITING VERIFICATION FILTER ***

For those that have only have a bit of spare time here and there, working off the JIRA filter that lists items awaiting verification is a great way to make a difference.

3. Samigo (Tests and Quizzes) 2.4 Update and Plans

I'm writing to provide an update on Samigo 2.4, which is in QA now along with the rest of Sakai. Improvements, new features, and future plans are noted below.

Colleagues from five other schools joined Stanford to contribute code to the Samigo 2.4 release, including new features, performance enhancements, and, of course, bug fixes. In addition to the Stanford team, contributors to Samigo 2.4 include: Lisa Wilson and James Renfro, UC Davis; Dave Ross, Albany Medical College; Joshua Ryan, Arizona State; and Diego del Blanco Orobitg and Raul Mengod, Universidad Politécnica de Valencia. A gold star goes to Stephen Marquard, University of Cape Town for his analysis, testing and advice. Notes below highlight the changes and contributions.

Many new features were added in Samigo 2.4, and are detailed on the Samigo project page at http://bugs.sakaiproject.org/confluence/display/SAM/Home

Performance improvement:

Samigo's stability and performance continue to be the top goals and continue to improve, and this release includes many improvements. Details are on the Samigo project page.

Unicon will join the Stanford team to work with Linda Place, the maven of performance and load testing at the University of Michigan, and her team, who have graciously offered to do a thorough load test of Samigo 2.4. We'll update you as the analysis progresses.

Future plans:

After the release of 2.4, the load testing is our next big milestone. The outcome of this process will inform the 2.5 release.

Ideas for features and extensions continue to pour in, and we would look forward to planning the roadmap with the community. We'll begin by working with the upcoming Sakai requirements process. The Sakai requirements team will solicit community requirements for the entire product, including Samigo, this spring. Once this process is complete, we will work with the requirements team to analyze the results relating to assessment. We plan to host an assessment summit for contributors to work together on the roadmap for upcoming effort, likely during the summer.

I'll be in touch again to update you about the plans for Samigo 2.5 and the upcoming assessment summit.

7. Unicon and San Joaquin Delta College Contribute Newly-Developed uPortal Features and Code to uPortal Community

New Features Include an Email Preview Portlet and Updated News and Alerts Channels

Unicon, Inc. has announced that the uPortal development work done for San Joaquin Delta College (SJDC) has been contributed by the college back to the uPortal community. Unicon's recently-completed work began as a project in the fall of 2006 to develop and implement new features to the SJDC campus portal which included an Email

Preview Portlet and a News and Alert Channels. The new features are designed to benefit students, faculty, and administrative staff members of the online campus by providing them with a highly-accessible, personalized view of updated and relevant information after they login to the Web site. The act of contributing newly-developed features and source code to a community is consistent with the philosophy of open source software.

"These latest feature enhancements developed and contributed on behalf of San Joaquin Delta College are great additions to the uPortal open source community and the college should be commended for its citizenship participation in higher education," said John C. Blakley, CEO of Unicon, Inc. "Academic institutions are increasingly choosing open source applications as alternatives to proprietary solutions when it becomes time to upgrade or migrate to a different platform. In most cases, open source software is significantly less costly than proprietary software and also benefits the higher ed community as a whole."

"SJDC has committed to the development and use of open source software such as Kuali Financials, Kuali Student and uPortal. We have been a user of open source products and welcome the opportunity to continue to contribute in return." said Ralph Olstad, the SJDC uPortal project manager. "Unicon got us off to a good start on the project by developing our first portlets, providing training and project management services."

About uPortal's New Email Preview Portlet (EPP): The new EPP provides an interface where users can see a predetermined number of unread messages in their inbox in a small window within the portal. When the user clicks on the email in the preview window, a new browser window is launched and the user's mail inbox is presented. Unicon built a new portlet to provide this functionality, leveraging the Spring MVC framework. The EPP is a JSR 168 compliant portlet and can be configured to work with any IMAP server.

About uPortal's New News and Alerts Channels: The updated channels allow for two different types of announcements (Alerts vs. News) to be authored. Unicon modified the previous USC channels to allow for different property files to split the Alerts functionality into one channel and the News functionality into another. The two instances of the channel also utilize different style sheets, which allows for custom styling appropriate for the announcement type.

Short Chronology of Channel Development & Evolution of Community Source Software:

November 2004: Columbia University contributes its open source uPortal "Announcements Channel" software code to the JA-SIG open source repository.

March 2005: USC hires Unicon to make updates to the open source news channel to add more functionality, user interface refinements, and administration capabilities. USC then

contributes the updated "Announcements Channel" back to JA-SIG open source repository and uPortal community.

March 2007: Unicon completes development work for SJDC to create an "Email Preview Portlet" and to make improvements to the open source "News and Alerts Channel". SJDC is now contributing the features and software source code back to the uPortal community.
