Michael previously held positions of leadership and technology innovation at DigitalThink, Cognitive Arts Corporation and the Institute for Learning Sciences at Northwestern University. He has an M.S. in Computer Science from Northwestern University, and a B.S. in Symbolic Systems from Stanford University, two universities that are, coincidentally, members of the Sakai Foundation. He has also recently been contributing, as a volunteer, to the Sakai Requirements working group.

"Sakai is one of the most important technology efforts in higher education today and it is an honor to be joining the community. Everyone has collaborated to create a tremendous foundation, both in terms of product and community, and I look forward to helping the community realize the full potential of Sakai" said Michael. "I especially want to thank Chuck Severance, whose leadership as Chief Architect and Executive Director has made this incredible opportunity possible and has already provided invaluable assistance as we begin this transition."

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### 4. Major Roster Re-write for Sakai 2.5

A major re-write of the Roster tool has been underway at the University of California Berkeley (UCB) since Sakai 2.3, with the goal of addressing performance issues and enhancing functionality. This effort has reached a level of maturity at which the Roster Project Team has decided to make the UCB version or "new" Roster, the one destined for Sakai 2.5. As a result, on 30 May 2007, the new Roster code was merged into trunk (r31202). This change is also reflected in the membership of the Roster Project Team; Indiana was the initial design and development lead for the Roster tool, and is now handing off those responsibilities to UCB.

If Roster is an important tool for your implementation, I encourage you to begin evaluating it sooner, rather than later. This will help ensure that the functionality on which you and your users are dependent remains in good shape.

What does this mean for the 2.4 or "old" Roster tool? The Indiana members of the Roster Project Team will continue to work with the community through the 2.5 release to provide security and limited bug fixes to the 2.4 Roster tool. This will be available via the 2.4.x maintenance branch, as well as directly from Sakai's Subversion repository. Indiana is unable to commit resources to this effort past that time; however, if there is sufficient interest in the community, then those interested can take on the task of maintaining the old Roster in 2.4.x branch.

There is also a 2.4.x-compatible version of the "new" Roster tool, the "ucb" branch, which can be found in Subversion (<https://source.sakaiproject.org/svn/roster/branches/ucb>). As the trunk version of Roster continues to evolve through the 2.5 release, UCB will endeavor to keep this version up-to-date for folks interested in using the "new" Roster with their 2.4.x Sakai. UCB will be running this version in their production environment, however, please be aware that this branch was not part of the 2.4.0 community QA process, so consider it as "use at your own risk."

When the 2.5 version of Roster is released, UCB will have completed its volunteer commitment the project, and will be retiring from a lead role on the Roster Project Team. At that time the Roster tool will be in a relatively mature state and the project will enter maintenance mode; meaning we can count on UCB to continue to provide security and bug fixes, as needed, for the 2.5.x maintenance branch, but that no further development is planned. Further enhancement of the Roster tool will be left for others from the community to step forward and take on, though UCB and Indiana will endeavor to provide mentorship and help the next round of volunteers come up to speed.

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## 5. Updated Administrative Documentation for Sakai 2.4

For the last few months, I have been working with the documentation workgroup to compile the Sakai 2.4 Administrator's guide. The 2.4 Admin Guide is intended to help new administrators in moving from being able to set up Sakai out of the box to being able to support Sakai in production.

As Peter Knoop rightly suggested, the 2.4 Admin Guide (which is intended to be tied to a specific release) has a lot of overlap with existing SakaiPedia entries. With that in mind, I also went through and attempted to reconcile some of the content between the 2.4 Administrator's guide and the administrator's section of the SakaiPedia by linking back and forth between the two areas. I have also updated much of the SakaiPedia administrative content to fill in gaps, update content, and in general do a bit of editing for clarity. Finally, I collapsed the structure of the Administrative area of the SakaiPedia somewhat (moving pages around within that space), so that the tables of contents are a bit more readable.

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## 6. Announcing the Sakai Registry - Finding Sakai Information

With each passing release of Sakai there are more tools to choose from, new ways to customize, and improvements to integration. How do you find what you need to make intelligent decisions?

Introducing the Sakai Registry. The registry is a database of Sakai products: tools, services, and commercial offerings. Using simple search commands, you can browse through over 40 descriptions of tools. These descriptions include information on when the tool was released, what status it has (contrib, provisional, full support), and other technical data. Links are provided to the tool source, documentation, and related information. Screenshots are being added.

You are invited to comment on tools and later you'll be able to rate them.

While initially focused on listing Sakai products, the web site will expand over time to include other kinds of content as well. The first new content is "The People of Sakai", a series of articles about the movers and shakers in the Sakai community. You can read

interviews with Joseph Hardin, Jeff Merriman, and Charles Severance. A new interview with Rob Lowden will be posted soon.

The Sakai Registry is a joint project of Mark Norton and Erik Froese. The site is supported by contributions and advertisements. If this site is useful to you, please consider making a donation and supporting our advertisers. Money will go towards maintenance, expanded content and new features.
