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6. Michigan Releases 2007 CTools Survey Results

The CTools Team at the University of Michigan is pleased to announce the release of
selected results from the 2007 Information Technology and CTools Survey for the Ann
Arbor campus:

These selected results include responses from the 1,481 instructors and 2,281 students
surveyed about their use, preferences, and attitudes about information technologies and
CTools (CTools is the Michigan instance of Sakai) for their courses and projects.

Overall, 98% of students and 83% of instructors find CTools valuable or very valuable
for teaching or taking a course.

New this year, the annual survey asked instructors and students about Open CourseWare
websites and the potential value of their various uses. Also, instructors were asked an
open-ended question about how their CTools use has changed their in-class time. The
2007 results include example quotes from qualitative survey questions.

Several CTools-related questions were expanded or slightly modified to reflect the
growing variety of uses of this technology for courses and projects. New questions

included rating the value of individual tools, rating the importance of making project-related materials available to the public, and rating the necessity for increased instructor and/or student training.

Past CTools-related surveys dating to 2005 may also be found on the website mentioned above. Other Sakai institutions interested in surveying their users are highly recommended to also review the Sakai Survey Question Bank:
