6. What's Coming Up? Mneme - Test Center 1.1

On Friday, March 21, ETUDES upgraded their production to Mneme - Test Center 1.1-Beta. (ETUDES has been running Mneme 1.0 in production since December 28, 2007).

An official, public release of Mneme - Test Center 1.1 is expected to be released to the international higher education community on Friday, March 28.

Highlights of new features and functionality since Mneme 1.0 include:

- Add support for surveys. Any question type can now be a survey - not just likert scale.
- Add "Summary of Data" (statistics) for all assessments.
- Add ability to return attachments back to students with ANY question.
- Ability to upload images and media from your desktop to your questions through the editor.
- Add ability to annotate student's submissions directly in their answer.
- Break down "review" options further to show answer key, scores, etc.
- Add superscript, subscript, indent, and out-indent icons in toolbar of editor
- And a new full-screen button in Editor (opens editor in full screen window).
- Add image, link, and html icons in editor in student view (when responding to essays).

- Add ability to set special access permissions for a student from grading
- Ensure all user entered html links in questions open in a new window.
- Add column for "Accept Until Dates" on Assessments list. Convenient for setting all dates.

Beyond TC 1.1, the Mneme team will working on the following for June, 2008:

- Import admin tool to migrate Assignments to TC
- Download all assessments in zip format
- Import / export pools in .xml (support QTI formats, such as Respondus)
- Add new assessment type - 'skill practice'
- Download summary of submissions in Excel
- Show 'partial' score on student side / delivery
- Email score / review (optionally) to students

10. ITC 2007 Distance Education Survey Results: Tracking the Impact of e-Learning at Community Colleges

Student demand for distance education courses at community colleges continues to grow. It is no surprise that 70 percent of respondents in this ITC (Instructional Technology Council) survey reported that student demand exceeds current class offerings. The percentages for enrollment growth and student demand have remained consistent during the four years of survey data. Offering students online services and technology support is a priority on most campuses – it is most likely an effort to meet accreditation expectations of "equivalency." Many campuses have already completed this transformation and the 2007 survey data confirms they have made additional progress.

Administrators have consistently identified obtaining "support staff needed for training and technical assistance" as the greatest challenge confronting their distance education program during the four years of the survey. Administrators have consistently identified

"workload" issues as their greatest challenge related to faculty. Administrators had consistently identified "orientation/preparation for taking distance education classes" as their greatest challenge related to students during the first three years of the survey, but this year, the completion of student evaluations emerged as the new primary concern.

Administrators are not as concerned about faculty "buy-in" as they may have been in the past before this ITC survey got underway. Notably, obtaining student acceptance, recruitment, and interest in distance education have never been a concern or challenge. ITC created this annual survey in response to the growing need for national data related to distance education program creation and development, and for key issues related to faculty and students. Respondents completed 154 surveys out of the initial distribution of slightly more than 500, a 30 percent response rate.
