Jim, this is terrific.
And timely. We are preparing for a final assault on the Castle. A letter will be hand delivered to the Chancellor early next week and we could have a final answer on whether we can proceed by the end of the month (though, SUNY being SUNY, I wouldn't bet too much money on it). This paper will be extremely valuable to us, as it is tangible evidence that SUNY has been influential.

I do have a few minor comments:

1. As usual, you give me more credit than I deserve. While I did coin the term "LMOS", the thought behind the acronym was entirely a team effort. So, for example, when you refer to "Feldstein's vision" in footnote #8, it would be more accurate to describe it as "the vision of Feldstein and his SUNY colleagues." (We have to walk a fine line regarding official attribution to SUNY; otherwise my preference would be something like "the vision of the SUNY Learning Network." More on this in the next item.) You might also find it worthwhile to reference our LMOS wiki site: <http://confluence.sln.suny.edu/display/LMOS/Home>, which was written as a team effort, with Bernie Durfee taking the lead on the architectural discussions.

2. Since we still do not have official sanction for our plans, it would be both more accurate and more politically prudent to describe SUNY has proposing to implement uPortal with an aggregated layout rather than that we are implementing it.

3. For your suggested plan of action, it might also be helpful for implementers to work toward common user experience standards, so that the interface of a heterogeneously developed toolset can work seamlessly and intuitively from a user's perspective.

On a related note, I'm attaching the latest draft of our Center of Excellence proposal. The language has been approved by Sun and Unicon; we are currently working with some SUNY campuses and a few non-SUNY campuses to get official endorsements/offers of participation. Also, not yet in the latest draft is a commitment we just received from JotSpot to offer up free accounts and development support in order to use Jotspot for a rapid prototyping tool (among other things). Would Georgetown's Interoperability Center be interested in participating? We'd love to have you on board.
