### SEPP Discussion Groups

#### SEPP QA WG Update – Carol Dippel

##### Sakai QA 1.5.1

- The 1.5.1 release is very close to public deployment. The reason for its existence is to fix a significant Samigo integration issue on MySQL. The release also includes fixes for many Jira items.
- The release was regression tested against HSQLDB, MySQL and Oracle on Solaris.
- There will be two 1.5.1 release deployment packages: QuickDemo (QD) and QuickProd (QP). The QD package runs on HSQLDB and is intended for demonstration purposes only. The QP package includes separate instructions for MySQL and Oracle.
- The QD and QP instructions have been extensively tested with the goal of making deployment painless for SEPP institutions. The QD/QP will make it easier to start using Sakai quickly without wasting time trying to determine how to configure it.
- The QA process is improving. As a young, highly distributed team from multiple institutions, we're defining our own best practices as unique conditions arise. It's a rather fascinating QA organizational puzzle we have here!

##### Sakai QA 2.0

- Preparations are in-progress for the 2.0 QA effort. However, 1.5.1 release activities have impeded progress so we're in catch-up mode.
- We expect to have an initial test version of 2.0 deployed on stable at MIT sometime in the next few days. Tests will begin against HSQLDB as it's the easiest version to make operational.

#### SEPP Library/Repository DG – Jim Martino

The Library/Repository DG will hold two sessions at the Baltimore Summer Conference. The first session will address the development of use cases for repository connectivity and library services, and will include representatives from Yale and the University of Colorado at Boulder as well as a representative from the core Sakai institutions' libraries.

In the second session, Susan Hollar will give a technology demonstration of the UMich Sakai reserves tool which extends the Naew Tool. She will also lead a BOF session for those interested in exploring further development of this tool for possible use at other institutions.

The User Support DG recently had their first conference call on April 29<sup>th</sup>, attended by 16 people from at least 10 institutions. Topics ranged from help and training resources and user support across versions to the Summer conference. ## Invitation to Join a Sakai Tool Development Exercise - Mark Norton

Are you interested in learning how to write Sakai tools? Confused about JSF, dependency injection, tool registration, and portals? I would like to extend an invitation to 4-6 developers to join with me in developing a new Sakai tool from scratch as an exercise in learning how to write Sakai tools. The development process will consist of:

1. Deciding on what to build (two proposals so far)
2. Gathering use cases and requirements
3. Creating a user centric design and extracting system requirements
4. Distributed development
5. Review, Testing, and Results reporting

The intent is to design, build, and deliver the tool in time for the December 2005 SEPP Conference (Austin). The project will kick-off at a BOF Session in Baltimore on Wed., June 8th from 11am to Noon in a TBD location. There will be no other face to face meetings in order to avoid travel costs. However, project members should be prepared to participate in weekly phone calls (TBD) for the duration of the project. Attendance at the June 8th meeting is not required to participate in the project.

You should be a sound Java programmer with some experience in Tomcat web application development. I expect the level of effort will average to five hours per person per week over the course of the project.
