Summary

I work to create self-sustaining, global-scale, collaborative, open-licensed projects that help nonprofits--including NGOs and government agencies--to substantially improve their mission-performance. I have been involved with guiding nearly two-dozen such projects toward and into fully self-sustaining status, in fields including the arts, conservation, cultural heritage (libraries, museums, and historical societies), economic development, education, health, the humanities, and social services. Our projects are distinctive among charitable initiatives in that they achieve exceptional scale and sustainability (most operate globally; all are self-sustaining), enabling them to deliver extraordinary social impact and achieve social transformations previously thought impossible. They change lives, create jobs, and improve social justice outcomes. Perhaps most importantly, they are force-multipliers: they reliably improve the abilities of their nonprofit participants to pursue their own missions more effectively.

Christopher J. Mackie, Ph.D. is a technology professional with more than 20 years of leadership, management, philanthropic, and consulting experience in the for-profit and nonprofit sectors, including: education; healthcare; information technology; libraries; museums; the arts; and environmental protection.

Chris has been a technology change-agent throughout his career. After college, he participated in a series of startup ventures in healthcare and information technology. He then returned to graduate school in order to study policy making and leadership in higher education, as part of a successful transition to the nonprofit sector. While a graduate student, he also served as a consultant, researcher, and evaluator for state-level educational policy and regulatory agencies.

Most recently, Chris served as a program officer for the Program in Research in Information Technology (RIT) at The Andrew W. Mellon Foundation. RIT's mission was to support the development of information technology infrastructure and applications aligned with the nonprofit missions of Mellon's grantees in higher education, libraries, museums, arts organizations, and environmental conservation. At Mellon, Chris helped to guide more than a dozen global-scale, collaborative, open-source software projects—including Sakai and Kuali—toward and into wholly self-sustaining status.

Chris has consulted with a wide range of domestic and international nonprofits and NGOs on strategic technology planning, organizational design, leadership development, and institutional advancement. He serves on the Boardor as technology adviser to several nonprofit and forprofit ventures. A published scholar on education, energy, healthcare, and information technology policy, and a sought-after speaker on topics such as cyberinfrastructure, technology policy, technology strategy, and technology funding, he holds an A.B in International Studies from the University of North Carolina—Chapel Hill, an M.Ed. in higher education policy from the University of Michigan, and an M.P.P. and Ph.D. in International and Public Affairs from Princeton University. He lives in Princeton, NJ and New York City.
